The Chapter's lobbyist and the PGAC have been busy collecting data and determining the importance, determining the Chapter's position and considering any other actions that may be necessary. The Governor has 5 days, excluding Sundays, to take action on any bill passed by the Legislature, provided adjournment does not occur within those 5 days. After 5:00 p.m. on the 94th day, only initiatives and alternatives to initiatives, budgets and matters necessary to implement budgets, matters that affect state revenue, messages pertaining to amendments, matters of differences between the two houses, and matters incident to the interim and to the closing of the session may be considered.

Providing public notices of public health, safety, and welfare in a language other than English. Concerned about the costs.

SB 5046 (HB

1540)

Requires state agencies, that are required by law or rule to provide public notices to a community or area to advise or inform the public about an imminent or emergent public health, safety, or welfare risk, to provide the notices in the language that diverse residents can understand when a significant segment of the community speaks a language other than English and has limited proficiency in English. Requires each local organization or joint local organization for emergency management to maintain updated demographic data for their jurisdictions and information on the languages represented by their respective communities.

This bill has greater impact on Emergency Management in most jurisdictions but could impact PSAPs as well. The bill requires community notifications to be provided in languages reflected by the demographics within the intended audience area.
